On Wednesday 31st January Primary Care and Population Sciences hosted their fourth annual PhD conference, held at the Rose Road Association.

All PhD and MD students supervised by members of the department were given the opportunity to present their research. The whole department was invited and the event was well attended.

Eleven students presented their work, providing a diverse range of important primary care and public health topics. Research included coffee consumption and liver health; decision making around long-term antidepressant use; significant other experiences of active surveillance for prostate cancer; modelling the future of dementia care; and an exploration of placebo effects in general practice.
