
We have had a busy time reviewing the many applications to our PE Development (seed) Fund which came in during September.

- build a collaborative partnership between the University of Southampton, professionals, schools, early years providers, and children and young people.




# ACoRNS Free Live Webinar Digital transitions: Learning from lockdown for the future

#### Unpacking migration: regional diversity and impact on services

Webinars on 3rd & 6th November



In this series of <u>migration webinars</u> leading experts will discuss the social and economic impacts of migration, and the outlook from migration modelling.

CPC Director <u>Professor Jane Falkingham OBE</u> will be speaking at the first public webinar on 3 November, and CPC member <u>Professor Jakub Bijak</u> will speak at the second on 6 November. ## **Poetic Science**

In partnership with John Hansard Gallery and the Southampton Institute for Arts and Humanities, we are inviting research scientists, post-doctoral researchers and postgraduate students at the University of Southampton to take part in **an ambitious pilot project bringing together science and poetry.** 

Poetic Science aims to foster an environment of multi-disciplinarity, supporting postgraduate students, post-docs and researchers in the sciences to develop creative engagement and communications techniques about their research through poetry.

Participants will access 2, two-hour late afternoon creative workshops delivered virtually between 30th November 2020 and 28th February 2021. Facilitated by an experienced creative writer, participants will develop their skills in poetry.

Completed works will be showcased at a special Poetry @ JHG live public event, during the Science and Engineering Festival between the 5th - 14th March 2021

#### **Southampton a Mental Health Friendly City**


Communicare in Southampton have been leading for the last 18 months on the development of Southampton Mental Health Network (SMHN).

# Research project: Retrospective Survey of Prevention, Treatment, Occurrence and Outcomes of Covid-19 in the community (RTO-Covid-19)

(Faculty of Medicine)

Covid-19 is new, so we need to learn from everyone's experiences. There are so many things we need to understand, for example:

- Why do some people develop serious illness while others don't?
- Which preventive measures work and which don't?
- Which treatments work and which don't?.

The results of the study will be published in scientific publications, sent to participants who provide their email address, published online, and sent to key stakeholders.
