Welcome to the first newsletter for the HORIZONS study. Our aim with these annual newsletters is to keep you up to date with the study and how we are getting on.

HORIZONS follows a large group of recently diagnosed cancer patients over time to find out how cancer and its treatment affects people's everyday lives. By sharing your experiences we can learn how to improve the care that cancer patients receive in the future.

We are delighted with the support since the study started in September 2016. So far, over 1,644 patients are taking part from all over the UK. We are hoping to gather as many patients' views as possible to get a whole range of experiences.

Up to now, around 80% of you have returned your first questionnaire which is really encouraging but we would love to see this increase. The more of your experiences we have, the better the picture we will be able to create and this will help to inform care and support services to make important decisions.

We hope you will continue to support the study by completing questionnaires in the future. We want to know how cancer and its treatment affects the lives of people living with and beyond cancer. Thank you again for your time and support.

Why are the questionnaires long?

Our questionnaires include a range of different

topics that patients, health professionals and experts have told us are important to ask.

Some of these questions might seem repetitive but they measure slightly different things so it's very helpful if you answer all of these questions.

Are my answers still useful even if I've finished treatment?

We know people will have different experiences of cancer so it's very important to hear a whole range of these.

Whether or not you've finished treatment, don't have any symptoms or have moved on from cancer, we still very much want to hear from you because all your experiences are important!



- it has helped me to understand what symptoms can be expected
- to find reassurance that what I am experiencing is normal + predictable
- and to know that my experience can be helpful to improve the process for others
- it has helped to complete the questionnaire in stages as it is quite long, but all very relevant
