YOUR LEARNING

We offer much more than a traditional learning environment. With access to virtual learning 24-hours a day and the opportunity to develop your own education, Southampton provides a unique learning experience.

All medical students are allocated a Personal Academic Tutor and Senior Tutor on arrival who will help you to settle in and obtain the help and support you need. Academic and administrative staff are also available to assist students with day to day issues.

Facilities

Throughout your training you will have access to a full range of University facilities. These include the well-resourced Centre for Learning Anatomical Sciences and Clinical Skills Centre at Southampton General Hospital. The University has several libraries including the Health Services Library.

Applicants with a disability, condition or health problem

The University of Southampton has been closely involved with The Gateways Disability Project which has seen the General Medical Council joining forces with 11 medical schools to develop guidance on encouraging people with disabilities into medicine and continues to actively support applicants with disabilities who wish to pursue a career in medicine.

We have a special responsibility to ensure that all students admitted to the BMBS programmes will be eligible for registration by the General Medical Council upon graduation. It is important to us that our students are able to fulfil the rigorous demands of professional fitness to practise.

Students who are made an offer and who indicate on their UCAS form that they have a disability will be referred to the University's Enabling Services as part of the admissions process to ensure that the University is able to offer the appropriate systems of support. Any disability disclosed on your UCAS form will not be used as part of the selection process.

Both your offer and continued registration on the programme will be conditional upon the completion of satisfactory health screening. Health screening is assessed in confidence by staff in the Occupational Health Department at University Hospital Southampton. It is important that applicants disclose all medical/ health conditions - if you are unsure whether to include health or medical information on your Occupational Health form please include it.

In line with recent guidance, blood borne virus (BBV) testing will be performed during the initial stages of medical training, prior to undertaking any Exposure Prone Procedures (EPPs). Freedom from infection with BBVs is not an absolute requirement for those wishing to train as doctors, however satisfying additional health clearance, which includes determining their BBV status, is obligatory for those who wish to train in specialties that involve EPPs.

Support for students

The University Student Services Centre provides advice and information for students on issues such as fees and accommodation. Support is also provided for students with specific learning difficulties such as dyslexia, and the University also offers a wide range of support services. Course overview

Our BM4 degree programme enables graduates in any subject to achieve a BMBS degree in four years, drawing on existing knowledge, skills, understanding and life experiences.

The curriculum in the first 18 months is designed around a series of clinical topics which form the framework for your learning. You will undertake clinical placements, small group work, lectures and practical sessions which directly link to each of the clinical topics.

Full time clinical attachments start after Christmas in year two, when you will undertake placements in Medicine, Surgery and Primary Care, before joining the BM5 students for a common final two years for both programmes.

Course content

Learning outcomes considered within three levels of organisation (systems biology, individuals and population and society) are used to help structure your learning. Three themes (Communication, Diversity and Teamworking, Leadership and Patient Safety) underpin the whole of the curriculum and relate directly to medical practice.

The learning structured around clinical topics has some features in common with problem-based learning (PBL) courses. You will meet on a regular basis with other students in a Graduate Group. A substantial amount of work will take place in these groups.

The clinical sessions allow you to observe medical care related to the relevant clinical topic, and also to begin to develop your clinical skills.

Our integrated, systems-based BM5 and BMedSc programme is distinctive in many ways. You will learn from contact with patients in a variety of clinical settings, beginning in the first few weeks of your course; and in year two you will undertake weekend shift placements as a Healthcare Support Worker to gain insight into multi-professional teams working in hospitals.

We provide many opportunities for medical students to work and learn alongside other health professional students during their clinical placements.

Course content

In the first two years you will learn about the major physiological systems of the body, and integrate your learning in a clinical context. You will also undertake student selected units.

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We have developed our BM6 programme to widen access into the medical profession. The programme has achieved national recognition as an example of best practice. It involves studying for an extra year on a specially designed year zero before progressing to Year 1 to study alongside students on the BM5 and BM(EU) programmes.

You will receive extensive tutorial and pastoral support. The relatively small cohort size enables frequent opportunities for small group work and regular support and feedback on progress.

The timetabling of year zero, mainly over three days a week, allows students an opportunity to carry out some part-time work in order to support their studies.

At the end of the undergraduate programme you will receive your BMBS degree, which is a primary medical qualification (PMQ). Holding a PMQ entitles you to provisional registration with the General Medical Council, subject only to its acceptance that there are no Fitness to Practise concerns that need consideration. Provisional registration is time limited to a maximum of three years and 30 days (1125 days in total). After this time period your provisional registration will normally expire.

Provisionally registered doctors can only practise in approved Foundation Year 1 posts: the law does not allow provisionally registered doctors to undertake any other type of work. To obtain a Foundation Year 1 post you will need to apply during the final year of your undergraduate course through the UK Foundation Programme Office selection scheme which allocates these posts to graduates on a competitive basis. All suitably qualified UK graduates have found a place on the Foundation Year 1 programme to date, but this cannot be guaranteed, for instance if there were to be an increased number of competitive applications. Successful completion of the Foundation Year 1 programme is normally achieved within 12 months and is marked by the

award of a Certificate of Experience. You will then be eligible to apply for full registration with the General Medical Council. You need full registration with a licence to practise for unsupervised medical practice in the NHS or private practice in the UK. Although this information is currently correct, students need to be aware that regulations in this area may change from time to time.

The General Medical Council, the body that oversees doctor education and training in the UK, has decided to introduce a Medical Licensing Assessment – the MLA – from 2022 to demonstrate that those who obtain registration with a licence to practise medicine in the UK meet a common threshold for safe practice. Applicants should be aware that to obtain registration with a licence to practise, medical students will need to pass both parts of the MLA, pass university final examinations and demonstrate their fitness to practise as doctors. **OUTCOME OF THE COURSE**

The MLA will be in two parts: there will be a knowledge test, which will be set and run by the GMC, and an assessment, delivered by medical schools, that will evaluate students' clinical and professional skills.

Tuition fees and funding

The University will set fees for 2019/20 subject to any conditions imposed by government. Currently the tuition fee is £9,250*, but we offer a large number of generous fee waivers and bursaries for eligible students. For students from lower income families, these financial packages will be based on household income supplied to us by the Student Loans Company. Southampton has excellent transport links with the rest of the UK and internationally, by road, rail, sea and air.

By road

Our Southampton and Winchester campuses are well connected to the national road network. The M3 links Southampton and Winchester directly to London. For Southampton campuses, exit the M3 at junction 14 and follow signs for Southampton (A33). Follow the A33 into Bassett Avenue and follow signs to University campuses.

For Winchester School of Art, exit the M3 at junction nine or 10 and follow signs to the campus.

The M27 is one of the major road links along the south coast of England and passes Southampton to the north. For the University, leave the M27 at junction five (Southampton Airport) and follow signs to University campuses.

By air

Southampton Airport is about 20 minutes from the Southampton campuses by bus or taxi. There is a full UK domestic service, including flights to Manchester, Newcastle and Belfast, as well as flights to mainland Europe and flights to the Channel Islands. If you are arriving in the UK via London Gatwick or London Heathrow airports, you can reach Southampton by road, bus, coach and rail.

By bus

We run the award-winning unilink bus service that connects our Southampton campuses with all the major transport links in the city. You can buy tickets at the unilink office or on the bus. A free unilink bus pass is included in your first-year hall fees.

Downloadable for iPhone, the SotonBus app allows you to view bus and route information from all major bus operators in the Southampton area. With GPS positioning, you can find your nearest bus stop, plan routes and save frequently used bus stops for easy access.

By coach

National Express runs the 032 service to London Victoria Coach Station and the 203 service to London Heathrow Airport, both via the Highfield Campus.

By rail

Southampton and Winchester are well served by mainline railway stations - Southampton Central, Southampton Airport Parkway and Winchester. Fast trains from London and Bournemouth/Wevmouth stop at all three stations, and the typical journey times to London Waterloo from Southampton Central and Winchester are an hour and 20 minutes and an hour respectively. Winchester School of Art is a 15-minute walk from Winchester train station. The unilink frequent bus service (U1) connects into the Southampton Airport Parkway and Southampton Central train services, via the University.

Validation is the process by which the University approves its programmes of study. Any taught undergraduate and postgraduate programme leading to a University of Southampton award, including research degrees with a taught component (e.g. Engineering Doctorate) are required to go through Programme Validation. The full validation process can be found in the University's Quality Handbook: www.southampton.ac.uk/quality

1. Change or discontinuance of programmes

The University of Southampton will use all reasonable efforts to deliver advertised programmes and other services and facilities in accordance with the descriptions set out in the prospectuses, student handbooks, welcome guides and website. It will provide students with the tuition and learning support and other services and facilities so described with reasonable care and skill.

We undertake a continuous review of our programmes. services and facilities to ensure quality enhancement. We are largely funded through public and charitable means and are required to manage these funds in an efficient and cost-effective way for the benefit of the whole of the University community. We therefore, reserve the right where necessary to

- alter the timetable, location, number of classes, content or method of delivery of programmes of study and/or examination processes, provided such alterations are reasonable:
- make reasonable variations to the content and syllabus of programmes of study (including in relation to placements);
- suspend or discontinue programmes of study (for example, because a key member of staff is unwell or leaves the University):

- make changes to our statutes, ordinances, regulations, policies and procedures which we reasonably consider necessary (for example, in the light of changes in the law or the requirements of the University's regulators). Such changes if significant will normally come into force at the beginning of the following academic year or, if fundamental to the programme, will normally come into force with effect from the next cohort of students;

- close programmes of study or to combine or merge them with others (for example, because too few students apply to join the programme for it to be viable). However, any revision will be balanced against the requirement that students should receive the educational service expected. The University's procedures for dealing with programme changes and closures can be found in our Ouality Handbook at www.southampton.ac.uk/guality

If the University closes, discontinues or combines a programme of study or otherwise changes a programme of study significantly (the 'Change'), the University will inform applicants (or students where relevant) affected by the Change at the earliest possible opportunity

- a. If the Change comes into force before the University has made an offer of a place or before an applicant has accepted an offer of a place, an applicant will be entitled to withdraw his or her application, without any liability to the University, by informing the University in writing within a reasonable time of being notified of the Change.
- b. If the Change comes into force after an offer has been accepted but prior to the student enrolling, the student may either:
- i) withdraw from the University and be given an appropriate refund of tuition fees and deposits, or
- ii) transfer to another available programme (if any) as may be offered by the University for which the student is qualified.

If in these circumstances the student wishes to withdraw from the University and to apply for a programme at a different university, the University shall use its reasonable endeavours to assist the student.

c. If the Change comes into force after a student has enrolled, the University will use reasonable endeavours to teach the programme out but cannot guarantee to do so. If the University cannot teach out a programme of study, it will use its reasonable endeavours to facilitate the transfer of a student to an equivalent programme for which the student is gualified and which has places available within the University or at a different university. Any revision will be balanced against the requirement that students should receive the educational service expected.

2. Changes to services or facilities The University will make available to students such learning support and other services and facilities as it

considers appropriate, but may vary what it provides from time to time (for example, the University may consider it desirable to change the way it provides library or IT support).

3. Financial or other losses

The University will not be held liable for any direct or indirect financial or other losses or damage arising from such closures, discontinuations, changes to or mergers of any programme of study, service or facility.

Upon acceptance by an applicant of an offer of a place at the University, the relationship between the applicant and the University becomes contractual. When the contract is formed between the student and the University it will last for the relevant academic year only unless the student withdraws from the programme or the programme is terminated.

Please note: the right of a student to withdraw from a programme of study under the provisions set out in paragraph 1b. above following a Change are in addition to any statutory rights of cancellation that may exist under the Consumer Contracts (Information, Cancellation and Additional Charges) Regulations 2013. In entering into that contract, the terms of the contract will not be enforceable by any person not a party to that contract under the Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999.

Force majeure
