**INLAND TELEGRAPH.**—Poundage at ordinary rates, plus the cost of telegram of advice at telegram rate, with minimum of 9d. (Eire, 1/6), with a supplementary fee of 2d.

**IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN.**—Emergency arrangements (see Post Office Guide).

## Postal Orders

Issued by 6d. steps to 5/-; for 6/-, 7/-, 7/6 and 8/-; and by 1/- steps to 21/-. Poundage rates: Up to 1/-, 1d.; 1/6 to 5/-, 1½d.; 6/- to 21/-, 2d. Two stamps to the value of 5d. may be affixed to orders up to 4/6; to the value of 11d. above 4/6.

## National Savings Certificates

These may be obtained at most Post Offices, as follows: 1, 15/-; 2, £1 10s.; 5, £3 15s.; 10, £7 10s.; 25, £18 15s.; 50, £37 10s.; 100, £75. They are repayable at any time. No person may hold more than 500.

## Express Services

The following express services are available:—

**EXPRESS.**—Conveyance (at sender's request) of an article all the way by Post Office Messenger, or (at addressee's request) after its transmission by post to the delivery office.

**SPECIAL DELIVERY.**—Delivery at sender's request of a postal packet by Post Office Messenger on its receipt at the delivery office.

**RAILEX.**—Conveyance of a postal packet to a Railway Station by Post Office Messenger for despatch by the first available train and for its immediate delivery, also by Post Office Messenger, from station of destination.

INLAND PRIORITY.—An extra charge of 6d. each telegram (additional to the ordinary rate).

H.M. FORCES IN CAMPS OR BARRACKS.—Inland ordinary rates, but any length address counted as five words only.

On Sundays, Good Friday and Christmas Day all telegrams cost 6d. extra.

### Registration

INLAND (all kinds of packets).—Compensation up to £5, 3d. ; up to £20, 4d. ; up to £40, 5d. ; and so on up to £400 at the rate of an additional 1d. for each £20.

IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN (except Parcels).—Compensation for total loss up to £2, 3d.
